- Thought ► Read about David's relationship with Abigail in 1 Samuel 25. From the life of Abigail, what can you learn about how a godly woman can achieve godly ends through a male leader (in this case, a very angry male leader)? ► As you think through this you might consider some of the following questions. What was the eventual result of her action? Does God promise you the same result if you act the same way?
